# Supporting Engagement and Learning using DIR®/Floortime<sup>TM</sup>

Many parents of children with Autism

Spectrum Disorders or other developmental challenges find it difficult to relate to and interact with their child in meaningful ways that support learning. The DIR®/Floortime<sup>TM</sup> model is helping to change this by supporting parents and their children by meeting them where they are and building from that point. DIR®/Floortime<sup>TM</sup> is a developmental, relationship based approach to treatment that was developed by Stanley Greenspan, MD and Serena Wieder, PhD. This interdisciplinary model includes the "D" which is made up of six core capacities of Functional Emotional Development, the "I" which describes the individual differences of the child, and the "R" which focuses on relationships, the vehicle for creating learning interactions. Floortime describes the specific technique which often includes getting down on the floor to interact with the child, while focusing on the child's interests to maximize opportunities for interactions.

The approach follows a prescribed treatment plan that is developed for each individual child based on his or her own developmental profile and assists the child to: learn how to attend and remain calm, form relationships with others with engagement, initiate and respond to all types of communication, engage in shared social problem-solving that involves many interactions in a row, use ideas to communicate needs and emotions, and bridge ideas together to think logically, enjoy peer relations and master academic skills.

In addition, the plan pays close attention to the child's individual differences, which include the sensory processing continuum, attention, praxis (motor planning and sequencing), auditory/verbal and visual processing as well as the child's interaction with people and objects.

Parents play an integral role in treatment because DIR recognizes that you are your child's first and most important play partner. This relationship supports your child's learning and development. With guidance and support, parents learn strategies that increase their child's attention and interaction. The goal is to enhance social interaction by recognizing when and how to use affect as an important strategy to engage a child. Parents will find the child's "comfort zone" in play and be able to know when and how to use sensory input, physical activity, and language to engage the child and help them problem solve and elaborate on ideas.
